One in 40 Ashkenazi Jews carries a BRCA gene mutation, more than 10 times the rate of the general population, making Jewish families more susceptible to hereditary breast and ovarian cancer. In addition to BRCA1 and BRCA2, there are other genes (e.g., ATM, CHEK2 or PALB2) or Lynch Syndrome, any of which may predispose you to a variety of cancers including breast, ovarian, male breast, colon, pancreatic, prostate, uterine, and melanoma.
