

### The Gift Of Friendship Is A Peer Supporter

I was diagnosed with stage 2B ovarian cancer in late December 2019. My prognosis was good, my spirits were high, and I managed to make it through surgery and chemotherapy with a positive attitude and a smile on my face.

Thirteen months after treatment ended, I learned that the cancer had returned. My positive attitude was replaced with fear; my smile dulled by anxiety. Was this really

happening? How was I going to make it through this again? What I needed more than anything was to speak to another woman who had walked my path.

#### Talking with her was exactly what I needed to begin the process of reclaiming my positive attitude and my smile.

I reached out to Sharsheret and learned about the Peer Support Network. Soon after that first conversation, my Sharsheret social worker introduced me to Ruth Ann, who quickly became one of the most important people in my life. Aside from living with ovarian cancer, we have so much in common! Ruth Ann has been an unyielding source of strength and encouragement for me; talking with her was exactly what I needed to begin the process of reclaiming my positive attitude and my smile.

Every time we connect, I appreciate Ruth Ann's understanding, advice, encouragement, and comforting words. Our relationship has blossomed into the loveliest of friendships. We continue to talk frequently and support each other in all aspects of our lives – well beyond cancer. Though we live hundreds of miles apart, we are looking forward to meeting in person one day.

Sharsheret helped me turn things around. **They provided me not only with the support and resources I needed, but also with the gift of a true friend.** 



### **Attention, Men!**

My wife was the first in my family to pursue genetic testing. She wanted to be sure she was not one of the 1 in 40 Ashkenazi Jews who carries a BRCA genetic mutation. And she isn't.

Knowing that my sister had been diagnosed with breast cancer in her 40's, my wife suggested that I test as well. **To my great surprise, I tested positive for a BRCA1 mutation** in November 2018. Just 3 months later, my sister passed away having been diagnosed with late stage ovarian cancer. I don't think she knew if she, too, carried a BRCA1 mutation. If only I had known about my BRCA status sooner, perhaps her story would have had a different outcome.



### **From Destruction Comes Healing**

Nothing about my story is typical.

Results from my 2018 23andMe test revealed both my genetic history and also that my father who raised me was not my biological father; rather, my next door neighbor was. Imagine! And then in 2021, shortly after my father passed away, I got COVID and was diagnosed with stage 2, HER2+ breast cancer. I was an Irish/English woman, living with cancer, making sense of my genetic story whose life was about to change in ways I couldn't imagine.

I felt destroyed. I lost my health, my hair, my eyebrows, my "friends," my job, my savings, and mostly, myself. Nevertheless, I was determined to make the best of the situation and my time.

After my diagnosis, while exploring links for cancer resources, I found myself on Sharsheret.org - The Jewish Breast Cancer and Ovarian Cancer Community. I thought "oh well, that isn't me," but then I read a little further and learned that Sharsheret serves people who aren't Jewish, so I reached out. At the time, I couldn't have known how Sharsheret would help me turn everything around. The Pillow of Support provided physical and emotional comfort after my surgery, the Best Face Forward kit, which addresses the cosmetic side effects of cancer, helped me look more like myself, the Financial Wellness Toolkit and other resources informed me and guided me. **Perhaps most importantly, my social worker provided me with a listening ear and a safe space; she accepted me as I was and helped me along my path.** 

During my first conversation with my social worker, I mentioned that I had talked with a Rabbi about converting to Judaism over 20 years ago. My wheels started turning. Maybe now was the perfect time for me to study and convert! I had the time. I started attending online classes and learning how to read Hebrew. I reached out to a local synagogue in Cincinnati for more resources, and

I understood that **because I carry the BRCA1 mutation**, there was a 50% chance that each of my children could also test BRCA+. Though one of my daughters did test positive and has important decisions to make in the coming years, my wife and I are thankful that she has this information - we are confident that it will save her life. though I was invited to join services in person, I didn't feel comfortable going out - I was still in treatment and I didn't have eyebrows or much hair.

It may sound trivial, but not having eyebrows was traumatic for me. My Sharsheret social worker told me that through the BFF2.0 program, through which Sharsheret provides financial subsidies, I could undergo microblading for free! I felt like a piece of my life was returned to me.

Nearing the end of treatment, I started a new job. Instead of going to medical appointments, I started working full time, going to synagogue services on Shabbat and taking more classes about principles of Judaism. I received a class assignment to do a brief presentation about a Jewish person who inspired me. **Without hesitation, I chose Rochelle Shoretz A"H,** Sharsheret's founder. I shared her story with my class, highlighting all that she had accomplished in her brief life, helping others while she was on her own cancer journey. She said she was going to "live every day." I, too, am going to live every day.

Cancer is not the worst thing that has ever happened to me; in many ways, it helped me change my life for the better.

After I found out that I carry the BRCA1 mutation, I was connected with Sharsheret. I have learned so much through Sharsheret's educational programs and through opportunities to talk with other Sharsheret callers who also carry genetic mutations. I shared my story during a Sharsheret Pink Shabbat at my synagogue, and participated in Sharsheret's nutrition counseling program. I stay current with my screening mammograms, prostate checks, and colonoscopies, and I encourage Ashkenazi Jewish men I speak with to be screened for genetic mutations. When others hear my story, when I talk about my sister and my daughters, it is clear that genetic testing saves lives. **Knowledge truly is power.**

### Finding Hope And Honesty Through My Advanced Cancer Diagnosis

On March 1, 2021, thinking I had COVID-19, I went to the ER. I had a chest x-ray followed by more tests, and I learned that I had stage 4 metastatic breast cancer.

I had no symptoms. I did not feel ill. It didn't make sense.

In the next few weeks, my care team grew to include my primary care physician, an oncologist, a radiologist, and a urologist. Cancer was found in my clavicle, spine, pelvis, scapula, left kidney, and right breast.

I knew I had to take measures to address my cancer; if not for myself, then for my parents. When I shared my diagnosis with my friends and family, I felt as if I were sharing someone else's story. I was numb. I went to my medical appointments, completed my tests, took my medications, and did everything I was told to do. All the while, I had one intrusive thought: what have I done to deserve this?

My medical team had shared information about dozens of treatment options that I could choose to pursue; living with metastatic cancer, I am in this for the long-term. I can't do it alone, and thankfully I'm not!

Upon contacting Sharsheret, I was met with an immediate and unexpected response - kindness, generosity, and a non-judgmental listening ear. I am so very appreciative of each and every conversation with my social worker, and

I am grateful for every gift package that I have received; priceless gifts from the hearts of others which touched my own. My parents came over to watch me open my Sharsheret box, and my joy was theirs. Simple items can become one's bounty, and "little" things can heal.

I offer my deepest thanks to the Sharsheret community for their help, hope, and honesty. They have introduced me to a world of selflessness. My hope is that one day I will be able to create a legacy of my own that I can share with others as Sharsheret has so graciously shared with me. breast cancer. ### Shining A Light on Lynch Syndrome

In 2009, I was sure my BRCA test would be positive. I was an Ashkenazi Jew. I had been diagnosed with ovarian and uterine cancer. I'd grown up hearing about great aunts with unspeakable diseases. But BRCA wasn't my "issue." It took years before I knew what was.

In 2021, after another bout of cancer, further testing provided the answer: an MSH6 mutation causing Lynch Syndrome (LS). Though mainly associated with colorectal cancer, LS also increases risk for cancers of the uterus, ovary, pancreas, stomach, urinary tract, and more.

I was stunned. I'd never heard of LS. I'd never imagined that my reproductive system cancers were linked to my father's brain cancer. And I couldn't fathom how my seemingly textbook case was not diagnosed in 2009; instead, it was found only after a third cancer, many years later.

#### Finally, as I talked with the genetic counselor, I got answers to questions I'd had since first being diagnosed.

The same mutation was soon found in other family members. Follow-up screenings caught early-stage kidney cancer in one relative and pre-cancerous growths in another (quite young) one. These lifesaving screenings only happened because of our LS diagnosis. We are the lucky ones. In the US, roughly 1 in 300 people are thought to have LS, and most have no idea.



I'm so glad I found Sharsheret's website – finally, as I talked with the genetic counselor, I got answers to questions I'd had since first being diagnosed. I was also given an opportunity to share my story. I hope my experience motivates others with unusual patterns of cancer in their families to reach out to Sharsheret and pursue genetic testing - especially those who, like me, were narrowly tested in the past.

I think we're lucky to be alive during a time when many pathogenic mutations can be easily identified and proactively addressed. Let's do it!



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

With an eye towards advancing women's Torah leadership in the Orthodox community and the increasing incidence of breast cancer and ovarian cancer in the Jewish community, Ann and Jeremy Pava partnered with Sharsheret to develop and facilitate a certificate program to educate and empower Orthodox female Torah leaders. A generous grant from Micah Philanthropies funds the creation and teaching of unique, customized curricula and training programs for *Yoatzot Halacha* (Female Jewish legal authorities), Jewish communal professionals, Rebbetzins, *Mikvah* (ritual bath) attendants and others in communities across North America and in Israel. These women are trained to knowledgeably and empathetically advise and guide those consulting with them, and champion responses to cancer in their communities.








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# THIS YEAR SHARSHERET...
