## Sharsheret Awarded New York State Innovation in Breast Cancer Research Award

Sharsheret was recently named a 2005 recipient of the New York State Innovation in Breast Cancer Early Detection and Research Award. The annual award was presented by the New York State Breast Cancer Detection and Education Advisory Council to the President of Sharsheret's Board of Directors, Amy Mines Tadelis.

More than 100 guests attended the award reception in Albany, New York. "This New York State Award is an important acknowledgement of Sharsheret's impact in the cancer community," said President of Sharsheret's Board of Directors, Amy Mines Tadelis. ## Sharsheret Presents Two National Breast Cancer Symposia

Hundreds of men and women participated in Sharsheret's national medical symposia this year. Medical experts addressed patients, family members, and health care professionals at "Surviving Young: Life After Breast Cancer" and at "Hormones and Breast Cancer: Through Treatment and Beyond," both presented at major medical centers in New York City. Hundreds more across the country viewed national webcasts of these events on Sharsheret's website, www.sharsheret.org.

#### Survivorship

Many of the women who have called Sharsheret for support at the earliest stages of diagnosis have reached out again for support at the conclusion of active treatment. Sharsheret's Spring 2005 symposium "Surviving Young: Life After Breast Cancer" addressed questions and concerns, including "What form of continued breast cancer screening is recommended for young women who have already been diagnosed with

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# Sharsheret Publishes New Booklet Series for Women Facing Breast Cancer

Sharsheret has published and distributed 40,000 new booklets entitled "*Facing Breast Cancer as a Jewish Woman*" with support from the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation. This booklet is the third publication in Sharsheret's booklet series, the only culturally-sensitive resource available to Jewish women and families facing breast cancer nationwide. "*Facing Breast Cancer as a Jewish Woman*" addresses important topics for Jewish women of all affiliations including spirituality, Jewish holidays, community support, marriage, Mikvah, parenting through breast cancer, fertility, and pregnancy. The booklet also explores the concerns of working women and single Jewish women facing breast cancer.



"Demand for a publication focused on the concerns of Jewish women facing breast cancer has been high," said Sharsheret Program Director Elana Silber. The initial publications in Sharsheret's booklet series, "Facing Breast Cancer as an Orthodox Jewish Woman" and "Breast Cancer Genetics and the Jewish Woman," have already required second printings with more than 10,000 copies distributed nationwide.

# **Our Voices**

The first time I spoke to Michele, I knew I had made the right decision by calling Sharsheret and requesting a Link. She had been in almost the identical situation a year before, and had made the difficult decision to have prophylactic surgery. We became acquainted and agreed to talk again soon.

Michele has become a dear friend. She calls me at least once a week just to say hi. The most amazing thing happened when my husband, children, and I visited New York City a couple of weeks ago. When I saw Michele, I felt like I had known her all my life. We hugged and I knew at that moment that I had made a very special friend. We could have talked all day about anything and everything. Before saying goodbye, she handed me an envelope. She said that it was not a present and that she wanted me to open it later.

After a very exhausting day of running around New York City, I sat down in my hotel room and opened the envelope. Michele's note read as follows:

#### "Dear Judy,

The enclosed box is a gift of sorts. The necklace itself, I give to you on loan. It was given to me by my father (who is no longer alive) on the day of my wedding. He assured me that it would bring me good luck. Since the time I received it, I have loaned it to people I feel close to that are faced with a challenge. They return it to me when they are secured. The gift, therefore, is my most heartfelt wish that your surgery goes smoothly and as painlessly as possible. How appropriate it is that the necklace is actually a chain – a sharsheret – which is how our friendship began..."

## How Sharsheret Can Help

In response to the needs of the young women we serve, Sharsheret has launched three core programs:

The Link Program, a peer support network connecting young women newly diagnosed or at high risk of developing breast cancer with others who share similar diagnoses and experiences.

Education and Outreach Programs, including health care symposia addressing the concerns of young women facing breast cancer. Recent events addressed the subjects of breast cancer and fertility, breast cancer genetics, and survivorship. Transcripts of all symposia are available on Sharsheret's website, www.sharsheret.org.

**Quality of Life Programs,** including the *Busy Box* for young parents facing breast cancer, *Best Face Forward* to address the cosmetic side effects of treatment, and *Embrace*, a support program for women living with advanced breast cancer.

#### Below are introductory remarks delivered by Rifky Atkin, a Sharsheret Link who coordinated an outreach event in Edison, New Jersey.

"Eight and a half years ago, a woman in our town in her thirties was diagnosed with breast cancer. Like so many of us here, she had no family history of this disease and no apparent risk factors. She struggled to find someone her age to talk to, someone who could identify with what she was going through. But she found that nearly every name of any breast cancer survivor that she was hooked up with through caring family and friends had contracted this disease at a later stage in life, and were now a good bit older than she was. While it was encouraging to speak with these survivors, she couldn't help but feel that her concerns and fears were different than those experienced by the women she spoke to on the phone. That woman was me.

When my friend, Stephanie Sherman, A"H, was diagnosed soon after, the two of us decided to attend a breast cancer support group that was being held at the Cancer Institute in New Brunswick. I remember well the feeling we had as we sat in that room. Instead of making us feel reassured and encouraged, we felt isolated and alone. The two of us were younger than many women in that room by a good twenty years or so. We looked around at the others, and were envious of those women who were "lucky" enough to be grandmothers when they were diagnosed, while our children were still in elementary school.

I'm relating this to you to stress the importance of an organization

like Sharsheret. Today, 8 1/2 years after my own diagnosis, I feel privileged and grateful to be able to reach out to other Jewish newly diagnosed young women as a Link for Sharsheret. I know first-hand the reassurance that comes from speaking with a woman who has been in the same situation, and is alive and well years out. In my role as a Link, I can only hope to pass on some of that encouragement and reassurance that helped me get through the initial days of my own diagnosis and treatment. With its expanding circle of intertwining Links, Sharsheret is helping not only the newly diagnosed, but also the survivors of this disease - by allowing us to give to others the type of help we received in our own hour of need."

## Sharsheret Collaborates to Present Teleconference Addressing Diversity in Breast Cancer Care

This winter, Sharsheret co-presented a free national teleconference with the Young Survival Coalition, an international, non-profit network of young breast cancer survivors. "How Does Breast Cancer Affect Young Women of Diverse Backgrounds?" educated participants about the issues and concerns of often underserved populations facing breast cancer, the cultural disparities in breast cancer treatment, and strategies for health care professionals and patients to address these disparities. The

teleconference highlighted the unique concerns of Jewish, African American, Asian American, and Latina women facing breast cancer. Speakers included Dr. Freya Schnabel (Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center), Dr. Jenny Romero (Ralph Lauren Center for Cancer Care and Prevention), Dr. Olufunmilayo Olopade (University of Chicago Medical Center), Anita Broccolino (Mautner Project), and young women from diverse backgrounds who have been affected by breast cancer. "Sharsheret was excited to partner with the Young Survival Coalition to address the critical concerns of young women facing breast cancer," said Executive Director Rochelle Shoretz. "This teleconference brought together women and health care professionals of diverse backgrounds to share their perspectives on treatment, survivorship, and breast cancer care."

breast cancer?" "How do I cope with the fear that cancer will strike again?" "What is the most effective way to stay on top of emerging cancer research?" "What nutrition and exercise guidelines are available after treatment?" The symposium was presented at the Weill Medical College of Cornell University. Speakers included Dr. Ruth Oratz (Rose Medical Center), Dr. Thomas Kolb (Private Practice), Dr. Kutluk Oktay (The Center for Reproductive Medicine and Infertility), and Linda Roberts, LCSW (Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center).

"Survivorship has become an important subject of recent research, as more women live longer lives beyond breast cancer treatment," said Executive Director Rochelle Shoretz. "Sharsheret's symposium addressing survivorship empowered women with critical information they can use on the new journey that begins when treatment ends." The symposium was presented in partnership with the Lance Armstrong

Foundation, dedicated to providing the practical information and tools cancer survivors need to live strong. The symposium was also funded by a generous grant from the UJA-Federation of New York and with support from Fertile Hope and Weill Medical College of Cornell University.

#### Hormones and Breast Cancer

Many of the women who have called Sharsheret for support have expressed their concern about the relationship between hormones and breast cancer. Recent studies have explored a connection between hormone replacement therapy and increased breast cancer risk. New hormonal therapies have emerged in the treatment of breast cancer. For younger women, breast cancer treatment may impact fertility and the onset of premature menopause, and the resulting hormonal side effects can be troubling. Sharsheret's Fall 2005 symposium, "Hormones and Breast Cancer: Through Treatment and Beyond," addressed the role of hormones, if any, in the cause of breast cancer, new hormonal therapies to treat breast cancer, managing the hormone-related side effects of breast cancer treatment and early menopause,

and the associated psychosocial issues for young women and Jewish women. The symposium was held at Mount Sinai Medical Center in New York City. Speakers included Dr. Ruth Oratz, Dr. Gila Leiter, and Sharsheret Link Program Coordinator Shera Dubitsky. The symposium was made possible with support from the Greater New York City Affiliate of the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation and Mount Sinai Medical Center.

## Interactive Forum Enhances Sharsheret Website

Sharsheret has launched the Sharsheret Forum on **www.sharsheret.org**. The online, moderated Forum allows women facing breast cancer to post and respond to questions and concerns, and was designed to accommodate the needs of women who seek privacy in connecting with others who share their diagnosis and lifestyle. Family members and caregivers also benefit from participating in the Forum by sharing strategies with other caregivers who are facing similar challenges and concerns.

"Facing breast cancer can be overwhelming and its grip may extend to family, community, dating, fertility, marriage, parenting, and religious life," said Program Director Elana Silber. "The Sharsheret Forum provides a culturallysensitive space for women, their families, and friends to seek support and guidance in addressing their concerns. The Forum is convenient and confidential, fundamental qualities of all of Sharsheret's programs and services." Forum topics include facing breast cancer as a Jewish woman, dating and relationships through cancer, living with advanced breast cancer, and breast cancer genetics.

# For Women Living With Advanced Breast Cancer: Embrace Launched at Sharsheret

Embrace, a Quality of Life Program recently launched at Sharsheret, was designed for women living with advanced breast cancer. This critical program addresses the specific concerns of an often underserved community of women, including treatment options, pain management, quality of life, supporting family members and friends, and feelings of emotional isolation. The Embrace program includes individual counseling sessions by phone with Sharsheret's staff counselor, as well as a telephone-based support group connecting women with health care professionals and with each other. Resources specific to women living with advanced breast cancer are also offered to those participating in the program.

Interviews with women conducted by Sharsheret revealed that general resources and support available to those living with advanced breast cancer were extremely limited. "What differentiates advanced breast cancer from the earlier stages is fear of the unknown, pervasive in many areas including treatment, prognosis, family, and religious beliefs," said Link Program Coordinator Shera Dubitsky. "Speaking with a trained clinician will address the unique concerns instigated by the extraordinary circumstances of women living with advanced breast cancer, while participation in the support group will give women a chance to share their overlapping anxieties and their common resources."

The Embrace program was made possible with support from the Lucius N. Littauer Foundation and the State of New Jersey.

## Family is Focus of New Sharsheret Program

Sharsheret recently launched Family Focus, a program to address the concerns of the Jewish family facing breast cancer. The Family Focus program includes Sharsheret's new booklet, "The Jewish Family Facing Breast Cancer," included in a packet of resource materials to guide family members and caregivers through treatment and beyond. Sharsheret also offers "Ask Sharsheret," a phone line for family members to connect with Sharsheret representatives who can address questions regarding the care of a loved one, feelings, and concerns. "Caregivers have contacted Sharsheret with questions about how they can maximize support for their spouses, sisters, and friends, when much of the breast cancer information available seems unfamiliar, overly technical, and cumbersome," said Sharsheret Program Director Elana Silber. "Sharsheret developed Family Focus to address these issues and to enhance the quality of support the women of Sharsheret receive from their families."

## Starting a Local Breast Cancer Support Group? Sharsheret Can Help!

In response to requests from Jewish communities across the country, Sharsheret will develop **Sharsheret Supports**, a program to assist Jewish centers and communities working to develop local breast cancer support groups. The new program will provide support group leaders with guidelines for creating and sustaining culturally-sensitive support programs for Jewish women, breast cancer support resources, Sharsheret materials, and suggested support group topics. "Sharsheret Supports will address the needs of our truly national audience – Jewish communities in need of assistance in energizing local breast cancer groups," said Executive Director Rochelle Shoretz. "With Sharsheret's national guidance, Jewish women will benefit from enhanced support at the local level – resources and peer support that can prove invaluable during and beyond breast cancer treatment."

## Link Training Teleconferences Prepare National Peer Supporters

Breast cancer survivors interested in volunteering as Sharsheret Links – peer supporters in Sharsheret's national Link Program – can now participate in free teleconference training sessions. The teleconferences are designed to highlight Link Program guidelines, identify critical breast cancer resources, and address the challenges and joys of serving as a peer supporter. Teleconferences are conducted twice each year and include a question-and-answer session with Sharsheret's Link Program Coordinator.

More than 330 women from 29 states across the country have participated in Sharsheret's Link Program, a peer support network connecting young women nationwide. The Link Program pairs women facing breast cancer with volunteers who can offer culturallysensitive peer support. Callers are matched on a one-to-one basis with a "Link" who can address their specific concerns.

"As both a breast cancer survivor who is Jewish and a health care professional, I only wish your wonderful organization was available when I was diagnosed at the age of 41 in 1999," wrote one Sharsheret supporter. "I am so glad to know that young Jewish women facing this crisis in their lives can now turn to your organization and receive this special support."
