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SHARSHERET AWARDED FEDERAL SUPPORT TO AMPLIFY CANCER PROGRAMS

The Federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has awarded Sharsheret a comprehensive five-year grant to enhance support for young Jewish women facing breast cancer.

The prestigious, multi-year project, "LINK Program: Enhancing and Sustaining Structured Support Services for Jewish Young Women Diagnosed with Breast Cancer," is the second major funding award that Sharsheret has received from the CDC. Through the project, Sharsheret will grow The LINK Program, four culturally relevant breast cancer support interventions that provide patient navigation, peer support, genetics information, and survivorship resources to young breast cancer survivors.

"Sharsheret was founded to meet the needs of a highly at-risk population facing breast cancer," said Sharsheret Founder and Executive Director Rochelle Shoretz, herself a two-time breast cancer survivor. "Our accomplishments are many and our impact felt nationwide, but there is much more for us to do. The CDC cooperative

agreement presents an opportunity to strategically evaluate our programming with a focus on bridging the critical gaps that still exist in direct support, information, and health messaging for young Jewish breast cancer survivors."

At the onset of this program, Sharsheret will partner with public health scientists at Georgetown University's Lombardi Comprehensive Cancer Center to conduct a comprehensive evaluation process. Input from more than 40 existing national partners will be sought throughout the grant period. Ultimately, Sharsheret will disseminate its project findings to facilitate replication and adaptation of interventions among other high risk and young breast cancer survivor populations.

"With advancements in cancer research, detection, and treatment, the number of cancer survivors is increasing," said Shoretz. "It is the responsibility of Sharsheret to amplify our work to enhance the quality of life and reduce the cancer burden for young breast cancer survivors."

From Lost Caller to Peer Supporter



Looking back almost ten years, I think the first overpowering emotion I associate with my Stage 2 breast cancer diagnosis at age 25 is loneliness. It came before fear, denial, sadness, anger, and pain. No one could possibly understand what I was experiencing. Enter Sharsheret. The staff,

peers, resources, gifts in the mail, and the intense realization that I was in no way close to alone in my journey.

I will never forget my first peer phone call. Within 60 seconds, I experienced something that had not happened since diagnosis - I laughed. A lot. I started to feel like maybe everything was going to be ok and maybe there were people who could understand this insanity.

I spent 16 months doing chemo and then the real healing began. This stage was even harder than the illness itself. I had to figure out my "new normal" and rejoin my previous life. With Sharsheret staff and a new peer supporter, I started to figure it all out and focus on my future.

I re-entered the dating world. Who was I now? How was I going to address the "cancer thing?" It was a rough road of disappointment and confusion, and a different kind of pain. There were tear-filled conversations and practical advice from Sharsheret. In time, I was dating someone very special. He knew the broad strokes of my "story," but not the real details. With help from Sharsheret, I figured out a very specific plan of action. Eventually, as a couple, we worked through difficult conversations and moments. Doesn't everyone spend their fourth date sitting with an oncologist discussing cancer and the future?

I had found an incredible partner. But, the more my life was moving forward, the more it became clear that my cancer survivorship had a huge impact on each step. As I was getting married, Sharsheret came through again. The consistent support and meaningful help truly came from my Sharsheret Ladies, as I started calling them. I am blessed with a oneof-a-kind family whose love knows HAD BREAST CANCER no boundaries - but for what they could not understand, they would AT 25 CHANGED MY ENTIRE ask, "Have you called Sharsheret?" WORLD. I THOUGHT I COULD Most recently, I called Sharsheret DO IT ALONE. I WAS SO for the next thing that has come up. We are expecting our first child WRONG. I NEEDED HELP and I needed a totally new kind of AND I GOT IT FROM MY support. It was a really fun call to make and I know that there was joyful screaming in the office as these women had become like family.

> Having had breast cancer at 25 changed my entire world. I thought I could do it alone. I was so wrong. I needed help and I got it from my Sharsheret Ladies. I am now a peer supporter to others and a speaker to college students and other young leaders. This transition from lost caller to peer supporter and presenter was a huge deal. I was recently on the phone with someone in the office and panicked when I asked if I could still call in as a survivor. I was told of course Sharsheret would be there for me and my family for many healthy and happy years to come.

SHARSHERET ON CAMPUS

Young adults on college campuses are our future – future health care professionals, future community leaders, future parents, and unfortunately, the next generation to be affected by a diagnosis of breast cancer or ovarian cancer. With a 1 in 40 chance of carrying the breast cancer gene (BRCA) mutation, compared to 1 in 345 in the general population, young Jewish women and men need to have access to resources that empower them to be proactive about their health before the diagnosis of cancer.

To date, working with campus partners (Hillel: The Foundation for Jewish Campus Life, Chabad on Campus, Alpha Epsilon Pi, and Alpha Epsilon Phi), we have impacted nearly 30,000 young adults nationwide through Sharsheret on Campus. The merit of our programming prompted AEPhi to select Sharsheret as a National Philanthropy in 2007. In celebration of AEPhi's 105th anniversary last October, the sorority encouraged their sisters to mark this occasion by hosting an AEPhi/Sharsheret Pink Shabbat event. TEAM SHARSHERET: ONE FAMILY'S PERSONAL MARATHON

Just days after her daughter's wedding last February, Vivian went for a mammogram. A few weeks earlier while at work as an occupational therapist, a child jumped up and hit into her breast. It was unexpectedly painful. Although Vivian wasn't due for a mammogram until the following year, and her most recent one the year before had been fine, her still tender breast prompted her to get screened. Vivian had breast cancer.

Vivian's oldest son, Evan, called one day following her diagnosis. He told her about Sharsheret, an organization he had learned of from his wife's family. "They are here to help you, mom," he told her.

An avid baker, Vivian already knew of Sharsheret informally. But Vivian didn't think she needed help. "Whatever was coming my way, I could deal with," she said. "But as a wife and mother it pained me to see my family in pain. I think this experience was harder on them than it was on me. But I couldn't prevent it. There was nothing I could do. And there was nothing they could do for me."

It was especially difficult for her husband, Barry. A urologist, Barry had diagnosed more than 3,000 people with cancer; still, he was not prepared to be on the receiving end of such news. "It's difficult to go through this," he said. "It's a life-changing experience."

So while Vivian handled notifying their extensive group of family and friends of her progress,

Barry and their children reached out to Sharsheret. They found answers to questions and learned that there were others going through what they were experiencing. "I knew they had a place to go to help them. When they didn't want to burden me, they had Sharsheret to turn to," said Vivian.

And it was through Sharsheret that Vivian's family finally found a way to "do" something for her. With Passover approaching, middle son Jeremy mentioned that he was signed up to run the NYC Marathon. Youngest son, Ricky, decided that he, too, wanted to run and do so in honor of their mother. Evan also joined in, having run a marathon 10 years ago. Barry, who had last run a marathon some 20 years earlier, decided to run as well. Soon, all four men were signed up to run together as members of Team Sharsheret.

"Training together was therapeutic and cohesive for us," said Barry. "Every week we ran, following each other's progress through a text message chain. We had nothing else to offer Viv as she went through surgery and chemo, an experience I equate to its own marathon. It's like a 45K - a challenge to your body."

As they trained, they raised money for Sharsheret. On the first day friends and family donated \$5,000. Soon, they were up to almost \$20,000 - funds, they knew, that would help other families like them talk to staff clinicians or pay for the package Sharsheret sends to help a woman navigate her breast cancer journey. "Even when a person says they don't need anything, it is still so very touching to receive this lovely

package, to know someone is thinking of you," Vivian said.

The day of the race, Vivian tracked her men as they ran their way through the city. As each one hit the 21-mile marker on 5th Avenue, Vivian left the sidelines so she could run side by side with them for two blocks. When they all gathered together later that day, Jeremy presented

his mom with a medal identical to the ones her family now wore. "'You ran your own personal marathon,' he told me."

While her race is not over, Vivian and her family know that Sharsheret is there for them every step of the way.

You are not alone

It was a dreary October afternoon when I checked into the emergency room. I had been experiencing some rather disturbing symptoms for quite a while, but like the typical Jewish mother, chose to focus on the health needs of my family. For all you Monday quarterback readers out there – I know the song. Should have, could have, would have – but this is not how this story goes.

Enter Sharsheret. Little did I know then, but Sharsheret holds your hands in their hearts regardless of who, what, when, and where you are. My first call connected me to Sharsheret's Director of Navigation and Support Services. The welcoming warmth of her voice will remain etched in my memory. Her calm, professional manner enabled me to take a grip of the situation. She told me, "You are NOT alone."

Sharsheret sent me a welcome package, a makeup kit, and, most important, a booklet called "Our Voices" that truly framed how I faced the disease. I was completely overtaken by the writer who made a party out of what should have been a dreadful chemo affair. Her positive upbeat attitude became my mantra and guidepost. Every chemo session was an excuse for a different type of fiesta. There was music and laughter among the tears. But again, the focus, as the blessed writer guided me, was centered on living LIFE.

At one point, Sharsheret gently steered me to pair up with a peer supporter. At first I thought there could not have been a greater mismatch. But it was exactly what I needed. This disease has a lot of personal ramifications not easy to share. As a long time survivor, my peer supporter remains an anchor of support across the miles – informative



and supportive without being intrusive, my own custom-designed angel from heaven to help me weather this storm.

And what a storm this is. With the grace of G-d I am now disease free, and have great hope for the future. But let's face it, a diagnosis of ovarian cancer is not a picnic in the park. Reaching out to Sharsheret has helped cushion the blow.

I feel as though I have a very special connection with Sharsheret. They had just become a budding non-profit when I was first diagnosed with breast cancer at the age of 33. It was 2002: I had just moved to Atlanta and had to start chemotherapy as soon as I arrived. You can imagine how thankful I was to find Sharsheret's Peer Support program that hooked me up with a

woman who had gone through the same thing. It truly was a blessing to have someone who could relate to everything I was going through call and check on me weekly.

Five years passed cancer-free and everything in my life was going great. My husband and I had adopted a baby from Guatemala. He was about to turn four when I got the news that changed everything. "Your cancer is back." I literally fell to the floor crying in desperation. This was not supposed to happen to me. I immediately called Sharsheret and started to have a weekly conversation with someone from their support staff. I joined the Embrace program and they got me to the place where I could accept my "new normal."

Fast forward five more years and I am still able to watch my precious child turn ten years old due to the miracle of more treatment options in advanced breast cancer. It is funny how life works because when I got the call to be asked to write this piece I was going to call Sharsheret myself! I had just found out last week that the medication I was on for years had stopped working and I am going to have to change treatments again. Any time I need extra support, my go-to people are those at Sharsheret. It is an amazing organization where I receive love, guidance, and most important understanding about the toughest part of my life. They truly are a blessing that I could not have done without.
